

Editorial: Year of Mercy



On the 8th December, Feast of the Immaculate Conception, the Mother of Mercy, Pope Francis launched the Year of Mercy with the solemn opening of the Holy Door. A very important symbolic act performed by each pilgrim is to pass through the Holy Door. Christ identified Himself as 'the door.' "I am the gate. Anyone who enters through me will be safe; he will go freely in and out and be sure of finding pasture." [John 10. 7-9]

To pass through the door is to pass from this world into the presence of God, just as in the old Temple of Jerusalem on the feast of Yom Kippur the High Priest passed through the veil covering the doorway of the Holy of Holies to enter into the presence of God to offer the sacrifice of atonement.

On the day of Atonement, Israel confessed the nation's sins, and asked forgiveness and cleansing. The high priest entered the Most Holy Place of the Temple on this day alone. Recognising this day as the holiest of feast days, Jews neither ate nor drank for twenty-four hours.

One of the details that all three synoptic gospels give us at the death of Jesus is: "And suddenly, the veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom." (Mt.27:51, Mk.15:38, Lk.23:45) The veil of the sanctuary marked God's presence in the Holy of Holies. No person could go beyond that veil, save the High Priest on Atonement day. Behind this veil dwelt the Spirit of God.

The tearing from top to bottom of the veil means that now everybody is allowed to go into the presence of God and that the function of the Holy of Holies is not needed anymore. Every human being may approach God. God is not remote from humanity, but invites all to his love. St. Paul tells us that at that time: "God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not holding anyone's fault against them, but entrusting to us the message of reconciliation." (2 Cor.5:19)





As we celebrate the Year of Mercy, Pope Francis wishes that everyone, regardless of their state, be able to make a pilgrimage through a Holy Door. To pass through the door is to confess with firm conviction that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, the Lord, and the Savior who suffered, died, and rose for our salvation. With great courage, a person freely decides to cross the threshold leaving behind the kingdom of this world so as to enter the new life of grace of the Kingdom of God.

When the door opens, the obstacles of passage to our Lord are removed. During the Holy Year, we hope and pray that the obstacles of personal weakness, temptation, and sin will be removed so that we will have a holy union with our Lord.

During this Christmas Season and the coming year, as we celebrate the Year of Mercy, let us remind ourselves of God's great love for us; that He became one like us to save us from our sin and make us friends with Him and with one another.



Wishing you and your families a Happy and Holy Christmas and a Blessed New Year.

Let us open the stable door and help change ourselves and the world



One of the key symbols of the Year of Mercy which has just started is a Door. Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St Peter's on the 8 December and local doors are being opened in Cathedrals and churches throughout the world. But why the emphasis on doors? A holy door has been used since the fifteenth century as a ritual expression of conversion. Pilgrims and penitents pass through it as a gesture of leaving the past behind and crossing the threshold from sin to grace. But the door finds meaning only when the believer associates the door with Christ. Jesus is the Door!

This theme of the importance of doors was reflected by Cardinal Peter Turkson speaking about the 2015 United Nations Climate Change Conference in the light of Pope Francis' recent encyclical "Laudato Si". The encyclical identifies the possibility of a door to a sustainable future, calling us to question the way in which humanity is closing the door on itself if nothing is achieved by the meetings in Paris.




Through the imagery of doors Cardinal Turkson explained the way in which we can use prayer and dialogue to bring about transformative results. The use of the door imagery is continued in regards to the season of advent, allowing for the door to the liturgical year to be opened to the birth of Jesus Christ. Within the encyclical Cardinal Turkson identifies the 5 goals, which he defined as doors to the future of the social and natural world.



Door 1: To recognise that the climate change crisis affects everyone and everything. A prime example of this links back to 2010, when the volcanic ash of Eyjafjallajökull caused complete chaos to the entire world.





Door 2: Everyone must act. This arguably is the overriding message of *Laudato Si*, that a legally binding commitment is needed on a global scale not just as individual.

Door 3: Everything is connected. There are connections between all of creation, just as God the Creator had intended it. How we treat the earth, reflects how we treat humanity.

Door 4: To be truthful. Cardinal Turkson calls for us to stop pretending that progress can be measured by economics, that “masking problems” helps no one. We need to go beyond our faith in order to challenge public attitudes.

Door 5: Encouragement. As with all global issues, there is room for everyone’s point of view. For these issues to be rectified there must be a dialogue.

In addition to these 5 doors, as Cardinal Turkson imagined it, is education. He encourages us as Catholics and as CAFOD supporters and volunteers to be encouraged to open the door again and again. The issue of climate change is not a short term problem that can be fixed by opening the door only once, but by doing it again and again.



The 6th door is Prayer and Pray. This is the epitome of *Laudato Si*, which in itself is a prayer, allowing for a deeper dialogue with the Creator. *Laudato Si* aims not to condemn development but to adopt a bigger and high vision, balancing humanity with humility.




The nine children in the programme this year are working diligently at the communion classes with their catechists (and on the homework, which is essential to the programme).

The Sacrament of Confirmation – 2015/2016



The course of preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation this year started on Tuesday 10th November, preceded by a Parents' Meeting on Tuesday 13th October. We have 13 candidates, the biggest group for many years: Jaiden Aaron, Reanne Allen, Candice John-Baptiste, Aoife Cronin, Mario-Tristen Joseph, Joshua Kaad, Helen Leslie, Caneho Moloi and James Nichols.

Fr Anthony uses different resources to make up the programme, which consists of power point presentations, music, questions and answers, scripture reading and activities. Each session begins with an opening prayer which was compiled by the candidates, and finishes with a closing prayer. Candidates are encouraged to take part in discussions, and put forward questions and queries.

The programme consists of 4 parts: The Period of Invitation concluding with the Mass of Enrolment; the Period of Formation concluding with a Day of Reflection at the end of which there will be the Mass of Election. The Period of Reflection includes the Weekend Retreat at Wlasingham House on Colney Island, which leads into the receiving of the Sacrament of Confirmation on 11th June 2016 by Bishop John Sherrington. The Period of Mission takes place after Confirmation.



Our candidates have demonstrated their interest and knowledge during the sessions and we are confident that they will become an active part of our parish community.



The stage is set with scenery of marvellous trees and exquisite buildings. Cue the music, cue the lights ... it's Christmas at Kew. And it's absolutely magical.

Christmas at Kew is an extraordinary nighttime spectacle of light and music in the magnificent setting of Kew Gardens. It all starts as twilight falls, when a one mile long glittering trail is lit up for visitors to follow as it winds its way through Kew Gardens.

One walks through a wild garden with flowers and trees never seen before. They are flowers and trees imagined by the artist and created through the use of light bulbs in various shapes and sizes. One passes by the giant figure of the Holly King where story tellers bring to life fantastic tales of the Holly King and his court with juggling, fire breathing and stilt walking. One even walks through the tunnel of lights.



This was Christmas at Kew 2014. The light trail and shows were created by a number of artists and experts who combined their creativity and skills to great effect and the result was stunning.

Along the trail one could make a wish for the year to come and hang it on the wishing tree. Of course, Christmas is not complete without a mistletoe moment - under a real mistletoe or under Britain's largest mistletoe sculpture made of stainless steel.

The little ones could meet Santa and the snowflake elves at Santa's Grotto and towards the end of the trail they could enjoy family rides and an adventure playground.





Apart from the illuminated walkways, there were also two light shows, one on each side of the Palm House. The show on the pond side of the Palm House was mesmerising. The lights and the dancing fountains were set to the tune of Carol of the Bells and it was with great effort and the promise of more fabulous sights that I managed to walk away to carry on the rest of the trail. I really could have stayed there and watched and listened all night.

On the other side of the Palm House the show was dazzling, with pyrotechnics thrown into the mix. Here it was flames that danced with the lights to music from the Nutcracker.



All along the trail visitors were tempted to indulge themselves with mulled wine or spiced cider, with freshly roasted chestnuts or with marshmallows that they could toast over the fire.



What else can one say? Looking forward to Christmas at Kew 2015.

A school is a great place to work at Christmas time as we prepare the children for the joyous occasion of the birth of Jesus.

We begin at the end of November with our Advent services when the children all gather to celebrate the beginning of the build up to Christmas. The focus is on preparing and being ready, looking after others and being charitable. We introduce the Advent wreath which then becomes the focus for all of our communal worship sessions in the hall.

The build-up involves a great community event when we hold our Christmas Bazaar. It is an exciting afternoon when we arrange for a special visitor who lands on the roof with his reindeer and then spends the afternoon in his specially prepared grotto giving out presents to the children.



The teachers spend December getting the productions ready for our main celebration. In the Infants this year we are performing 'A Child is born' which will be shown to parents, carers and grandparents. This is followed by our Junior classes Carol Services.

As you can see we are surrounded by shepherds, angels, various animals from the crib scene and of course Mary, Joseph and Jesus! If anyone has a donkey they could lend us for next year we will use it!

Each class has its own charity to support during the year and each Christmas we support 'Text Santa' by wearing our Christmas jumpers or by working in local shops to raise funds.





Our choir travel to Westminster Cathedral for a carol service organised by the Catholic Children's Society and celebrated by the Cardinal. This is a very happy occasion and is famous because of the annual appearance of a 'live' donkey and sheep! The children really enjoy this and their singing is beautiful. We then join with the other Catholic Schools in Harrow for the annual carol concert at Harrow Boys' School which is held in their speech room. This is a tremendous opportunity for our pupils to be inspired in such an historic place—the Prime Ministers of the future!

No Christmas is complete without a pantomime and we have one every year. This year we will be treated to Pinocchio which will be great fun and is always enjoyed by all - especially the teachers!

Our Term always ends with a whole school assembly which is a very special occasion. We reflect on the Term and celebrate the successes and acknowledge the not so good parts. Our prayers are then offered as a whole community and then the oldest and the youngest pupil take the baby Jesus and place him in the crib, which ends our school Term.



I would like to thank Fr Anthony and all the parishioners of St Erconwald's Church for their continued help and support. I am very proud that children come to St Bernadette's from your Parish and we would welcome you as visitors to any of our school events. I wish you all a very peaceful and holy Christmas!



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

