

Editorial: "Rejoice and Be Glad"

Welcome to the summer edition of the magazine.



On the feast of St. Joseph, 19th March, Pope Francis published the Apostolic Exhortation *Gaudete et Exultate*. Its title is taken from the words of Jesus: "Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven." [Mt.5:15]

Gaudete et Exsultate is meant to be practical, a meditation on how to respond to Christ's invitation to be saints: to "Rejoice and be Glad." As he states in his introduction

the aim of this exhortation is "to repropose the call to holiness in a practical way for our own time." (#2) The Pope considers holiness as "The Lord asks everything of us, and in return he offers us true life, the happiness for which we were created." (#1)

THE CALL TO HOLINESS: In the first chapter, the Pope reflects on the fact that we are all called to holiness: "Be holy, for I am holy." [Lev.11:44] He mentions the saints and martyrs [those canonized] and the good examples they set us. But he also praises "the middle class of holiness", the everyday

sanctity of "those parents who raise their children with immense love,



in those men and women who work hard to support their families, in the sick..." and in the holiness found in our next door neighbours. (#7) So, let us be encouraged by the examples of these people, as each one of us walks his/her own path and which the Lord himself has planned for us.

Pope Francis also makes specific mention of women, both those holy women [like St. Bridget, St. Catherine, St. Teresa and St. Therese],

who emerged in times "when women tended to be most ignored and overlooked", but also those "unknown or forgotten women who, each in her own way, sustained and transformed families and communities by the power of their witness." [#12]



The holiness to which the Lord calls each one of us grows through small gestures. The Pope gives the example of a woman who, though tired, listens lovingly to her child, who finds time to pray, who helps others. These are all steps along our way to holiness. The Pope also emphasises the need, even in our busy life, to find time be alone with God in prayer: "Finding that space may be painful but it is al-



ways fruitful." (#29) He encourages us to allow ourselves to be loved and set free by God; to be guided by the Holy Spirit.

Inspired by Gaudete et Exultate, and in the light of Love In Action, perhaps during the summer months, we can reflect and act on the questions that the Pope asks: Are you called to the consecrated life? Be holy by living out your commitment with joy. Are you married? Be holy by loving and caring for your husband or wife, as Christ does for the Church. Do you work for a living? Be holy by labouring with integrity



and skill in the service of your brothers and sisters. Are you a parent or grandparent? Be holy by patiently teaching the little ones how to follow Jesus. Are you in a position of authority? Be holy by working for the common good and renouncing personal gain. [#14]




The occasion was well attended by parents, sponsors, family and parishioners. The candidates were very


This is a summary of the thoughts and feelings of the candidates about the Sacrament of Confirmation and the preparation programme:

He invited the couples to pray for God to 'renew within them that initial dedication'



and be joyful that 'these promises of marriage endure and give shape to our lives.'

Over the last few years Saint Laurence's Larder has changed. The Larder is moving more towards being a Community Luncheon Club whilst still continuing to be a Food Bank for people in need i.e. working mums, the homeless and the marginalised.

Many of our guests now come twice a week for the companionship, fellowship, and a nourishing three course meal. We also offer a take away evening meal service that is proving popular with our guests.

For the homeless we offer the goods shown in the photograph - light and easy products for the homeless to carry. The guests can add a tin of sardines to their take away meal and can always ask for hot water to make up a Pot Noodles or a CupaSoup in any cafe.

City Harvest supply us with fresh food up to three times a week and many of the products can then be sent to Christ Church School, Willesden Lane. The families are grateful and full of praise for the work of The Larder for their families.

St Laurence's Larder relies on many donors, including yourselves, in helping to meet the needs of marginalised people. St Laurence's is grateful for all the donations it receives and thanks to the people of St. Erconwald's for their continuing generosity and support.

You will have read from recent Church Newsletters and the posters on the noticeboards, that the Preston Community Library recently opened a new Memory Lounge, which meets every Monday between 2.00 - 4.00pm.

In case you are not aware what is meant by the Memory Lounge it is basically a Dementia Café that has been set up for people with dementia and their families and friends to meet and socialise. It has been running for a few weeks and during this time it has attracted a lot of people from the surrounding areas including residents from local care homes, and along with partaking in refreshments of tea, coffee and biscuits there have been opportunities to participate in activities such as playing games, singing and guizzes. However, please note you do not need to be affected by dementia to attend, and evervone is welcome.

At the same time the Memory Lounge offers something else no other dementia café has in Brent, which is an information and advice service on learning more about dementia and my involvement with the Lounge focuses specifically on supporting those family carers who cannot attend the Wembley Dementia Carers Support Group, for example.

I realise that many family carers feel they cannot get out of the house because they have no one else to help them look after the person they care for. Therefore, if you are in this position then I would encourage you to take advantage and go along to the Memory Lounge with the person you care for, and socialise with the other people who attend. At the same time if you would like a chat about what you are going through I can confirm that the Wembley Dementia Carers Support Group meets on alternate Mondays in the Parish Hall [see newsletter and noticeboards]. I will be at the Lounge from around 3.15pm.

If you would like to find out more information about the Memory Lounge please contact the Library or myself.

One of the questions we looked at as a parish in the Love in Action program is "Who is my neighbour?" As well as the people living next door, in our road, in our area, in our country are our brothers and sisters elsewhere in the world created, like us by God, and, like us, sharing in His creation. So how do we care for our neighbour: how do we show our love in action? CAFOD is one way in which we can respond to this

invitation. Our donations enable our partners in other countries to support those with needs, particularly the basics, water, food, education, housing and an ability to earn an income. The funding also means that CAFOD can make help available when emergencies and disasters occur. But the challenge is also to change the way things are: to make our world more fair and just. CAFOD seeks to do this with the campaigns it runs and those it supports. One you may have seen men-

tioned (clue - it has been in the parish newsletter) is *Share the Journey*. This is a worldwide Church campaign inspired by Pope Francis's special concern for migrants and refugees where we are being called to share the journey of people on the move.



DID YOU KNOW?

- More people are on the move now than ever before. Every minute, 20 people around the world are newly displaced.
- Half of the world's refugees are children, and thousands take flight without the protection of parents or other family members.
- Three out of four of the world's refugees are hosted by developing countries.

In September 2018, world leaders will agree two new global



'compacts' (or agreements) at the United Nations: one on refugees and one on migration. Pope Francis has spoken of this as a 'unique opportunity' for Catholics worldwide to put pressure on governments. We are calling on world leaders to make a united, global response, through agreements which:

- ⇒ Respect human dignity
- ⇒ Protect the vulnerable
- ⇒ Support host countries
- ⇒ Keep families together
- ⇒ Tackle the reasons for migration.

You can support this campaign by signing the CAFOD petition to the

Prime Minister urging Britain to play a leading role in the forthcoming global compacts on migration and refugees. The petition is at https://eactivist.com/page/12965/petition/1

There are other ways to support the campaign. One is a walk by individuals and parishes of 24,901 miles – the distance around the whole world! The purpose is as an act of solidarity to share the experience of our global neighbours fleeing their homes. Every step we take, together with others from across the country, will send a message to world leaders that they must step up too. At the time of writing this, walkers

from parishes in England and Wales have already clocked up the 24,901 miles and the walks now are adding up to a second journey round the world (details at the Share the Journey website above). Can you walk in solidarity? If not, and in any event, please take a moment to think of those refugees forced to leave their homes and make a journey and thank you for your support.





We have had a great Summer Term at St Bernadette's. It began during the Easter holidays when we took our school group to Lourdes as part of the HCPT pilgrimage that takes place every Easter. We took a group of 5 children and 5 staff for our 7th trip. It is always a tremendous spiritual experience for all involved and we are able to celebrate our school's Saint in an appropriate manner.

During the course of this Term our children have worked very hard with the Y2 and Y6 pupils completing their SATs followed by a celebration when we took the whole school to the Circus in our park. This was an incredible experience as we packed out a Circus tent with 500 of our children and staff all of whom had a great time!





We have completed our exchange programme with our link School in Madrid (Colegio Miramadrid). In April they sent us 20 pupils who stayed with our children and then in June we took 14 pupils over to them for a similar experience. Both sets of children had a great time sightseeing in the capital cities, speaking new languages and making new friends for life. This will be con-

tinued next year for our Y6 children.

In May our Y3 children made their First Holy Communions in the Parish of All Saints and our other link Parishes. We bring them all together when we celebrate their FHC assembly in June, which is a chance for them to dress up again and re-live their big day. It is lovely to have them play a more complete role in our School Masses as they receive the Body of Christ.

In May we had the biggest celebration of the lot when our School's football team Fulham FC won the Championship Playoff Final at Wembley Stadium! The whole School wore black and white on the Friday before to prepare and after 43 years of waiting we celebrated as a community when



waiting we celebrated as a community when they won the Final!

Recently we have interviewed our Y5 pupils for the role of a Pupil Chaplain which they will perform for us in Y6. We appointed 12 Chaplains and their job is a vital one for us as they lead the children in the prayer life of the school. They are responsible for assemblies, supporting other children, working with allocated classes and charitable works. I am very proud of the current Chaplains who have done a great job and I am sorry to lose them.



In June we held a Mission for all of our Junior children when the Franciscan Monks visited for the day. They held an assembly and then worked with our Chaplains and a group who were specially selected. They were an inspiration and

we hope to have them again next year. Our Mission Statement is based on the work of St Francis and we encourage all of the children to '*Preach the Gospel at all times and if necessary use words.*' Our children are very good at following this Mission.

We held our annual Grandparent's Day at the beginning of June. This is always really well attended and gives us an opportunity to say thankyou to some of the most important members of our community. We held assemblies, class visits followed by a Quiz Night in the evening—it was a great day!



As we move towards the end of Term we currently have World Cup fever and each class has two countries to support as part of a sweep-stake. They are studying the geography of those countries and hoping that they do well in the tournament.



We are now preparing for our new intake in September when we will be welcoming children and families from your Parish into our community. I hope that they are very happy here and I look forward to showing members of your community around St Bernadette's in the Autumn Term. always looking for new players, coaches, managers or admin staff to support the running of the club.



<u>School Masses</u>: We have been celebrating Mass in our classes during the year thanks to the priests from Saint Joseph's Parish. The children have greatly enjoyed this opportunity as have the parents who have attended with their children. The parents are also attending a parent prayer group in our prayer room in the junior school.

<u>Pentecost/Royal Wedding Celebrations</u>: We marked Pentecost this year with a dress up day and a range of Pentecost activities. The children enjoyed the day which culminated with a picnic in the field to also celebrate the Royal Wedding.

<u>Healthy School Week</u>: One of the highlights of the year on the sporting calendar is the celebration of Healthy Schools week where we organised a number of external providers to come in to give children new experiences and new skills.

A-Life: We had a group from a company called A-Life in who provide Healthy Workshops with minimal teaching and maximum pupil participation. Sessions were differentiated throughout, increasing in difficulty across the key stages. Pupils were challenged to stretch themselves beyond their existing knowledge and experience of healthy living as they solved problems, answered thought-provoking questions and completed tasks. Activities were stimulating and engaging with the key messages of looking after our bodies and keeping healthy infiltrating the day. Parents (where possible) also joined their children in the activities and feedback from both groups was very positive.

Football coaching: We had a Tottenham coach who had already done a term and a half with the juniors, work across both Key Stages one day of the week. He worked on their football skills and was assisted by our sports apprentices and teaching assistants. The children enjoyed taking part and keeping active and were well worn out after the sessions. A year 2 team also went on to win the Wykeham Football Trophy this July!



Chess: Children also had the chance to experience/practise chess. For some of them this was completely new and for others was a great chance to compete against others.

Yoga: The Yoga teacher who takes sessions on a Monday also gave a day to both schools for them to experience the 'calming' effects of yoga movements.

Saracens Rugby: One of the coaches from Saracens came in to work across both schools giving them fun drills and activities as a taster to real rugby.

Dance/Gym: Our usual coaches came in that week as well as part of the sports programme to continue the variety on offer this week. The children love gymnastics and look forward to their lessons. We also entered teams for the borough gymnastics tournaments. We entered team in KS1 and both the lower and upper stages of KS2 and won all three. Giovanna Kitton RIP [22/732 - 24/4/18]



Giovanna, or Gio as you may have known her, was an active member of the St Erconwald's community from when she and her family moved to Wembley in 1971. She passed away recently and this obituary has been written by her four children.

Gio was born in 1932 in Savona, a working port in Liguria, in the north west of Italy. Her father was a Captain in the merchant navy and served in both

World Wars. He was a decorated war hero, having been awarded a gold medal for bravery in 1918. Gio's mother was a devoted Catholic and a strong supporter of her local community.

Gio grew up in Savona with her parents and younger sister. She studied Law at the University of Genoa and went on to become the first female barrister from her province.

She married an Englishman, Tony Kitton in 1959, Tony was friends with Gio's favourite cousin and that is how they met. After the wedding, she left Italy and moved to England. Gio and Tony first lived in Kent, then Surrey and moved to West Hill, Wembley in 1971, when the Kitton family became parishioners of St Erconwald's church.

Tony sang in the church choir and read at Mass. Both of Gio's sons - Andrew and Robert, served on the Altar, both receiving their ten-year service silver medals. Gio had always wanted to serve on the Altar as a girl but back then only males were allowed. She was so happy and proud when several of her granddaughters became Altar servers. One of Gio's daughters - Helen was married in St Erconwald's.

When Gio retired from her job teaching Italian, she spent more time with her family, enjoying her eight grandchildren. She also increased her time of devoted service at St Erconwald's. She carried out a number of roles including managing the repository, cleaning the church, counting the offertory and counselling the bereaved.

Sadly, the last few years of her life were beset with dementia, but she still knew what was happening at Mass and recognised hymns. She still enjoyed going to church, especially to St Erconwald's where she had spent so many happy years and made so many good friends.
