Welcome to the Pentecost edition of the magazine.

Hope you and your families have been keeping safe and well.

Once again we come to the end of the Easter Season as we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost - the descent of the

Holy Spirit upon the apostles gathered full of fear in the upper room in Jerusalem. Theirs and our waiting is over. This is not something that happened a long time ago to other people. It is happening today, here and now. Today each of us is filled with and anointed with the Holy Spirit. On Pentecost we celebrate and experience the powerful outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the whole church and on all those who call themselves disciples and followers of the risen Lord.

That is why on this day we celebrate "International Day", celebrating our unity in diversity and the many nationalities that form our Parish.



The first followers of Jesus weren't strong, courageous or even very faithful. They betrayed Jesus.

They denied and deserted him when he needed them the most. After his death they hid themselves away in fear. They had lost all heart and hope.



Through the Holy Spirit, they were given new hope, new heart and new purpose. Their fear and silence was replaced by courage and conviction. They left their hiding place and made their way into the streets and proclaimed the good news of the resurrection. They became new people with a new message. Jesus commissioned them to continue the work that he had begun: "As the Father sent me, so I send you."

We are no different than these ordinary men and women. Through our baptism and confirmation, each of us has been filled and anointed with the exact same Holy Spirit. Just as the first followers of his proclaimed the good news about Jesus; we too are called to do the exact same today.



Just as these men and women were transformed into energetic and outspoken witnesses of Jesus, so too must each of us today. Like the disciples on that first Pentecost, we welcome the Holy Spirit into our hearts and lives to give hope to the hearts that are frightened.

There is nothing gentle, or mild about Pentecost. The Holy Spirit is powerful life-changing and energetic. The Holy Spirit challenges us and calls us to change.

As mentioned before, Pentecost is a golden opportunity for us to reevaluate our understanding of what being Church really means. We need to be a Church of renewal, of hope, healing and comfort. Since the Pandemic our community has changed. We have lost [either through death, because of ill health, or have moved away to be nearer family] a number of parishioners who were very dedicated and supportive of the parish. We need to rebuild that dedication and support with new members.

As Church, we are called to reflect unity and diversity. We are not called to uniformity. Unity presumes diversity and a variety of gifts and talents and responsibilities. Each member of the Christian community is to be aware of his or her gift. This gift indicates the role the member must play in building up the whole Body, the whole community. Each one of us is called and equipped by the Holy Spirit to carry out the great commission Jesus has entrusted each



of us with. We each play our own unique role in growing the church, nurturing each other as disciples and serving the community. Perhaps we can ask ourselves: How can I help? What are my talents and how can I use them to best serve my Church?

As we celebrate the feast of Pentecost, we pray that each of us will be refreshed and renewed by the Holy Spirit. May we do what Pope Francis asks of each of us, 'Go out again and again, without hesitation, without fear and proclaim the joy which is for all people.'

Once again, thank you for your support. With prayerful wishes for you all.

First Reconciliation



Lent is a time of preparation for the great feast of Easter. During this season, the Church encourages us to imitate Jesus and spend more time in prayer, be sorry for our sins and receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and do acts of charity towards others. These good practices help us lead a holier life and to participate fully in the joy of Easter.

Lent of this year was a special one for nine children in our Parish because they received another sacrament: Reconciliation.

In preparation for Reconciliation, a Power Point Presentation of the Parable of the Prodigal Son was presented to the children. Then using this story, it was explained to the children how they were to prepare themselves for Confession. To simplify things, the children were

told to remember five things they need to do when receiving this sacrament: Think, Be Sorry, Tell Sins, Say Penance, Say: 'Thank You'.

When going to the priest, we are like going to Jesus who did not judge the people as sinners, but welcomed sinners and forgave them their



sins. The priest is there instead of Jesus and forgives our sins by the power he was given by Jesus at his Ordination.

The 25th of March, 2023, was a special day for nine children from our Parish because in the person of Fr Anthony, they met Jesus who forgave their sins. Thus they became better friends with Jesus. We wish that these children will continue to receive this sacrament regularly.



Finally, we thank and say: "Well done", to the parents and guardians who regularly bring the children for their preparation for the Sacraments. Special thanks go to the catechists Bernie O'Reilly and Bernie Gillen (who were lately joined by Joseph) for their dedication in delivering this programme.

Mass with Anointing of the Sick



As part of the spiritual preparations for Easter, on Tuesday 14th March, a Mass was celebrated with the administration of the Sacrament of the Sick. The theme of the celebration was based on Pope Francis' message for the 31st World Day of the Sick. Pope Francis invited the faithful to reflect on the fact that "it is especially through the experi-

ence of vulnerability and illness that we can learn to walk together according to the style of God, which is closeness, compassion and tenderness."

After the Homily, the Liturgy of Anointing opened with the Penitential Rite, which included the Act of Contrition and concluded with the Prayer of Absolution.

Then the oil was blessed and each one of those present was anointed on the forehead and on their hands while the priest prayed: "May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up". For which each candidate answered "Amen".



We thank Fr Anthony and Fr Tony - who came to help Fr Anthony - for providing us with this opportunity to pray and get closer to God in our preparation for Easter.

At the end of Mass, Fr. Anthony invited everyone to the Hall for Soup and Rolls. We were pleased to see a good crowd and delighted to see Fr. Tony join us in the Hall, to partake of the Homemade Soups, rolls, tea/coffee, cake and biscuits. It is so good to see people enjoying the social life of the Parish again after a couple years of social isolation. There was a lovely atmosphere as people got to chat and enjoy a bit of lunch together.

Lent and Easter 2023

We were really pleased with the number of parishioners who ventured back during Lent and all the Easter services. It was wonderful to see so many familiar faces once again. Apologies for the lack of pancakes on Strove Tuesday, the cook was on holidays. We will strive to do better next year.



Ash Wednesday saw large numbers coming to receive their ashes and hear the familiar words uttered by Fr. Anthony and the Eucharist Ministers: "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." Serious words to begin our time of fasting, prayer, and abstinance. A word of thanks to all those who delivered Blessed Ashes to family

and parishioners. Just to remind us Covid hadn't gone away, a planned visit with Ashes to one of our Care Homes, had to be cancelled last minute due to the number of Covid cases. Thankfully a Catholic member of the Care Home staff was able to distribute the Ash on our behalf. Our sincere thanks to this person.

During Lent Stations of the Cross were prayed each morning before Mass and before Mass on Friday evening. On Wednesday after morning Mass there was Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, reflection and Benediction.

After the morning Mass on Wednesday, preparations were made for the "Triduum". Once the Church was prepared, it was time to prepare the 'Altar of Repose' in The Hall. Thank you to all those who helped.





'The Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper' with the 'washing of the feet' was celebrated at 7.00pm. The purpose of this exercise is to act as a physical reminder of the Lord's washing of the disciple's feet and a reminder of Fr. Anthony's priestly call to service of his flock, and of our service to each other. At the end of Mass all were invited to process into the Hall for a time of "watching" at the Altar of Repose. Good Friday, was a very busy day. A day of Fasting and Abstinence, and the only day in the entire year when Mass is not celebrated anywhere in the world. It was decided once again this year to hold two other services in addition to the 3.00pm. Service, in order to help with numbers and to facilitate those who can't be in crowds.

During the Family Service at 9.45 a.m. crosses were distributed to those present. After this service we all gathered outside and together with other Christian Churches in Wembley (Wembley Churches Together) we went on our silent "Walk of Witness". The final service of Good Friday was at 6.30pm. that evening.

The next morning, Holy Saturday, Morning Prayers were recited and the Easter Garden was set up, Vigil Candles prepared, Banners hung, extra seats put out and the Church cleaned in preparation for the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday Masses. Thank you to all those who came to help.



The Easter Vigil took place at 7.30pm. The Blessing of the Fire and the lighting of the Easter Candle took place outside the Front of the Church (Carlton Ave East) so we had some interested passers-by, who stopped for a while wondering what was happening. Fr. Anthony, along with the Altar Servers then processed into the Church followed by the congregation. Monica and the Choir lead the singing and as people entered the Church their candles were lit. The Easter Proclamation was sung by Monica.



We all sat for an extended "Liturgy of the Word". Here we meditated on the wonderful things God had done for his people since the creation of the world. Fr. introduced the readings, and a prayer followed each reading. After the Readings, the Baptismal water was then blessed, Baptismal promises renewed and the congregation was blessed with the Baptismal water. The Vigil continued with the "Liturgy of the Eucharist".

As the congregation left after the final hymn 'Thine Be the Glory' they were offered prayer cards and mini Easter Eggs.



Thank You! The Easter packs that were blessed at the Vigil for distribution to the Housebound were displayed in a basket on the altar. Most have been distributed but a few still remain to be delivered. They contained a palm cross, Easter Holy Water, Easter Candle, Good Friday Leaflet, Easter prayer card and a few mini Easter Eggs,

Easter Sunday Masses at 10.00am. and 11.30am. were well attended and had a greater number of younger parishioners in attendance. Fol-

lowing the 11.30am. Mass we held the Easter Raffle. There were lots of Easter Eggs, Easter Hampers and other goodies to be won. Most prizes were picked up on the day, those remaining prizes were collected the following weekend. Thank you to all who donated and all who supported the raffle. All proceeds went to the Church Refurbishment Fund.

"Walk of Witness"

Organised by the *Wembley Churches Together*, which consists of St. Augustine Church, Church of the Ascension, Church of the Annunciation, Sudbury Methodist Church, United Reform Church and St. Erconwald's Church, was held on Good Friday. The weather is usually good for this walk and this year was no exception.

As in previous years, St. Erconwald's was the gathering point. Following a short reading, we set off at 10.45am. Cross bearers, lead the way carrying the heavy wooden cross belonging to St. Erconwald's Church. The crowd following behind.

The route is the same every year. Up Preston Road as far as The Avenue. After a short pause, we then crossed over to the far side and proceeded to walk back down Preston Road to the Green opposite "The Preston" pub for our act of worship. Once assembled, a Reader from each Church read a passage from The Passion. This was followed by a verse of a hymn. The service ended with a blessing and all dispersed in silence. The Cross was returned to St. Erconwald's Church, ready for the 3.00pm Solemn Liturgy and the Veneration of The Cross.

The Walk of Witness attracts a lot of attention, its not every day you witness a big Cross being carried up Preston Road followed by Ministers and a crowd of different ages, nationalities, and physical abilities, some with walking sticks, in wheelchairs or babies in buggies. Leaflets were given to those who inquired, explaining what we were doing and why. Each Church provided a Steward to guide walkers safely across the roads, holding up the traffic when necessary. Thankfully the drivers were patient.

The Good Friday "Walk of Witness" is a very uplifting experience. Per-

haps next Good Friday you might consider joining us on this Walk. A word of thanks to the Ministers of all the Churches, Readers and Stewards and all who helped with this Service. Special thanks to Cllr. Daniel Kennelly, for organising with the Council, to have the Green cleaned prior to the Service.

A Coronation! What is that? The Crowning of a monarch, today Prince Charles....

Not many people would be lucky enough to witness such an event in their life-time. But we did it! Congratulations on the ceremony. What an achievement! Everything was perfect, the religious atmosphere, the rites, the military display to the smallest detail. What was remarkable

was that everyone was represented. It was quite moving to see the people's reaction, the enthusiasm on the road expecting to have a glimpse of the Royal Couple, an instant moment of pleasure.

In fact they could not see much but they were there, nearby, so much feeling, when they could be at home, watching TV, at close quarters.

And what about the meals in the streets? To celebrate in this way you have to be British! Not everybody's cup of tea!

There is no reason why people should not be happy in their own way. A memorable day for many. You did not have to be "local" to appreciate. Quite a few foreigners joined the crowd as well, having travelled half the world, at times to be in London. Now being able to say later: "Oh yes. I was there for the Coronation of King Charles III."

Saturday 6th May 2023 saw the coronation of Kind Charles III and Queen Camilla of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth. In the run-up to the event, the Catholics of England & Wales were asked to pray for the King and on the eve of the Coronation, Fr Anthony celebrated a special Mass in the Church.

During the Coronation, Cardinal Vincent Nichols, Archbishop Mark O'Toole of Cardiff, Wales, Bishop Hugh Gilbert of Aberdeen, Scotland, and Archbishop Eamon Martin of Armagh and primate of all Ireland joined other Christian leaders in the procession into Westminster Abbey and in invoking God's blessing on the new monarch. Also, in attendance as guests were



Cardinal Pietro Parolin, Secretary of State, representing the Holy Father, and Archbishop Miguel Maury Buendia, Nuncio to Great Britain. It is the first time in nearly 500 years that Catholic Bishops were present at a Coronation, in marked contrast to 70 years ago, when Catholics were not permitted to attend any service in a protestant Church.

Afterwards, thousands of members of the public lined the route back to Buckingham Palace, hoping for a glimpse of the King and Queen in the Gold State Coach, culminating in their appearance with other members of the Royal Family on the balcony at the Palace.

The Coronation was followed by celebrations across the United Kingdom including our own gathering in the Hall after the 5.30pm Mass, when refreshments were served and we recalled the historical events of the day.

We wish the new King and Queen a long and glorious reign.

Religious Articles Fairs



The weekend of the 25th and 26th March 2023 we welcomed The Bethlehem Nativity Group to the Parish This missionary group from the Holy land, is similar to a co-operative, Christian's in Bethlehem produce

handmade Olive wood and Mother of Pearl religious goods, the sale of which provides a source of income, in most cases their only source of income. Their representative Nicholas, who organises the transportation and visits of the religious articles from the Holy Land to all the Churches in the UK, made an appeal at all the Masses that weekend.

As Nicholas explained the Bethlehem Olive Wood traditional crafts began in the 4th Century, when the Monks based at the Nativity Church taught the locals the art. These skills were later passed on from generation to generation. The sale of these goods provides a much needed source of income for these Christians in the Holy Land. Sadly, due to the pandemic in 2020, sales were not possible due to travel restrictions, with the result that the overall income for these families fell by 90% (no Government hand-outs available there). Many had to close their workshops and some even sold their tools without which they would never be able to carve again. Some had to go abroad to make a living.

Currently, the Christian Community only account for 1% of the population. They need our support to remain there.

After all the Masses, Nicholas showcased the wonderful and very beautiful hand-made crosses, plaques and rosary beads, to name a few, in the Parish Hall. We were pleased that so many parishioners took time to go in to view them. After the event, Nicholas contacted us to thank us for hosting the event and for raising the sum of $\pounds 2,617$, thanks to parishioners purchases.

CAFOD's food campaign is urging the UK government to protect the right of farmers around the world to use their seeds. Seeds are life. They are the very foundation for farmers to produce the food that feeds us all.

For generations, small-scale farmers have freely swapped and shared a wide variety of seeds to pro-



duce food and maintain biodiversity. More recently, farmers have also developed seeds that ensure crops are resilient to climate change. However, their right to choose what seeds they use is increasingly under threat as new laws are introduced across the world that limit what small farmers can do with their seeds.

Our seeds need protecting: Small farmers' seed rights are under



threat. These laws, which are being brought in with the support of global financial institutions such as the World Bank, overwhelmingly favour large agri-businesses. Instead of being able to choose their own seeds, small farmers must purchase commercial seeds – something that is good for big business profits but not so good for the farmers who grow

the majority of the world's food. It's clear that our current global food system is in crisis, and at the heart of this crisis is a struggle over control of the world's seeds. Protecting the freedom of farmers to choose seeds is a right we must all stand up for if we are to tackle global hunger while responding to the cry of the earth and the poor.

The role of big business: In the 1980s, the ten biggest companies controlled less than 15% of the global seed market. Today that control is concentrated in the hands of just four companies who control 50% of the market- just a handful of private companies own half of one of the most precious resources needed to feed the world. Another way that giant agribusinesses are wrangling control away from farmers is through appropriating their traditional seed varieties. The goal of big business is clear: to restrict farmers' ability

to save and share seeds so they have fewer options and are pushed towards buying commercial seeds instead.



Is there an alternative?: Yes! Seed sovereignty is the right for farm-

ers to save, use, exchange and sell their own seeds. It is about farmers having the power to choose the seeds they plant, rather than that power belonging to corporations or international institutions. Small farmers are using seeds banks to let them choose what crops are most appropriate for them. Their methods have allowed



them to grow healthier, more sustainable food that provides for their families and goes for a higher price at their local market. This organic system can flourish on a far grander scale, but it needs the UK government to use its voice at the World Bank to create a more sustainable and supportive environment for farmers that trusts their knowledge and empowers them.

You can make a difference!: Let's follow Pope Francis's call and play our part in transforming the food system for the benefit of people and planet. The UK Government is a major player at the World Bank and one of the most influential countries in shaping the Bank's policies. If enough of us call on the UK representatives at the World Bank to do the right thing and stand up for farmers' rights to choose their own seeds, we can make a difference. Last month represented a decade since the first meeting of the Wembley Dementia Carers Support Group took place in April 2013. This followed an invite from Fr Anthony to begin a new group.

Sometimes I'm asked "Why do I run this and the other carers support groups ?" Therefore I thought I would share a little of my story to explain how I got involved.

In 2010 - unlike the photo you see here - I was not in a good place caring for mum at home. Although I had taken a career break from work, the emotional, mental and physical pressures were taking their toll (e.g. my weight ballooned to over 14 stone as a result of comfort eating). What made it really difficult were other complications, such as "battling" with our GP and Social Services to properly assess mum for her care and health needs.

Then out of the blue I received a telephone call, inviting me to attend some course on dementia. I had serious doubts this would be of any benefit to me, but I was persuaded to attend the first session.

The first session

On the way driving there I was thinking this is going to be a waste of time. I had left mum at home with a carer. What made it worse was I could not find a free car park place, and so arrived in a bad mood.

I did not know what to expect, and as the last person to arrive I was surprised to see so many other people. The session began, and what was to happen next changed my life forever.

We were asked to introduce ourselves, who we cared for, ... As each

person spoke I realised for the first time I was not alone. We were all different ages, backgrounds and ethnicities, caring for different relatives living with dementia, and I could relate to each and every one of their stories. It will always be one of the most emotional experiences I will ever have; there were quite a few tears in the room. When it was finally my turn to speak, it was the first time I felt able to talk honestly and openly about my situation.



I was hooked, and looked forward to the remaining sessions. Over the subsequent 5 weeks these strangers became friends. We would share tips, ideas and strategies on how to deal with certain scenarios that may arise, in supporting our loved ones. We faced common issues — which made the tasks of caring for a family member living with dementia more challenging — whether it was social services, NHS, other family members, etc. This had the benefit of being able to release all the emotions I had, which resulted in better caring for mum and the consequential benefit on mum as well.

Carers support group



As a group of family carers we wanted to continue to meet, and I agreed to act as the main contact. Only a few weeks later - in September 2010 — we formed Sudbury Dementia Carers Support Group. The group was committed to not just meeting ourselves, but invite other family carers to join us. It's impossible to gauge how many

people the groups have helped over the years. As for me the group supported me in being able to move on with my life after mum passed away in 2011, something I never expected. I hope this gives you an insight into how this experience helped me and others better care for loved ones with dementia.

If you know of anyone who is supporting a husband, wife, mother, father or someone else with dementia, please let them know about the support group. Even if the person they support has not received a diagnosis — which is often the biggest hurdle — help is available.
