Editorial: St. Joseph

Welcome to the Christmas edition of the magazine.

Hope you and your families have been keeping safe and well.



I thought of sharing with you some thoughts about St Joseph this Christmas.

When we are placing the statues in our cribs we give St Joseph a place of honour – together with Baby Jesus and Mary. In the Neapolitan Crib tradition, the Holy Family is placed on top of a few steps with the other statues placed below.

Joseph had no direct share in the Mystery of the Incarnation, but he was its guardian. When he planned to divorce Mary, the angel reassured him with the words: "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus." (Mt.1:20-21).

As a devout Jew he knew the Scriptures and the prophecies about the Messiah. He knew that the Messiah, according to the prophet Micah was to be born in Bethlehem: "But you Bethlehem, the least of the clans of Judah, out of you will be born for me the one who is to rule over Israel." (5:1) And now here he was in Bethlehem. Though living in Nazareth, he and his wife Mary came to their town Bethlehem to register in the census called by the Emperor Caesar Augustus.

Standing close to Jesus and Mary, he must have reflected a lot about his mission from God. By now, his doubts about Mary must have all been solved.

Hearing what the shepherds had to say about how they came to know that the Messiah was born, Joseph must have felt more reassured about the honesty of his wife Mary.

But Joseph's share in the Incarnation wasn't only of guardian. It was through him that Jesus could be called 'the son of David'. He was of royal descent. Even if his occupation was that of a carpenter, he was of noble

and royal blood. If Israel had wanted to elect a king at that time, Joseph would have been one of the contestants. As the foster father he was to name the child Jesus which means 'saviour' (Mt.1:25).



This humble guardian had his hard times as well. When Herod heard from the Magi that a new King was born, he wanted to get rid of the baby and ordered the killing of all babies under two years. Warned by an Angel, Joseph picked some tools and together with Jesus and Mary left Nazareth and found refuge in Egypt.



The Holy Family stayed in Egypt until an angel of the Lord told Joseph that he may return to Nazareth because Herod had passed away. Here, again another prophecy was being fulfilled: "I called my son out of Egypt." (Hosea 11:1).



Let us turn to St Joseph and ask him to intercede for us and grant us the grace of being humble and to fulfil God's will in our lives even when it is hard to do so.

Today a 14 pointed star marks the place on the floor where the child was laid in the manger and the words read "Here. We kneel filled with awe and worship."

First Holy Communion

The class meets every other Saturday in the Hall. At the same time the parents meet in the Church. Fr Anthony leads this meeting. During this meeting the parents are given information about the session their children are having. They are also given sheets with notes from the lesson for the children to fill in the blanks and stick in their scrap-book.

Apart from lessons about Reconciliation and Holy Communion which the children are going to receive in 2024, the programme includes also topics like Friendship, the Word of God and Peace and Joy. Towards the end of the lesson, the children are given pictures about that day's topic, to colour in. These pictures are then placed onto a banner which is hung in the Church.

The attendance for the lessons is very regular. Almost every other session is followed by a link Mass which takes place a week after, on Sunday in the Church at the 11.30 a.m. Mass

Next year, the children will receive two more sacraments: Reconciliation, which will be celebrated on Saturday 16th March in the church at 10.30 a.m., and their First Holy Communion on Saturday 25th May at 10.30 a.m. On Saturday 20th April there will be a practice for the children on how to receive Holy Communion.

The programme ends with a special celebration on the feast of Corpus Christi (the Body of Christ) Mass on Saturday 1st June.

We congratulate the parents for presenting their children to prepare for and receive these sacraments, and hope to see them regularly for Sunday Mass.

Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a national holiday in the United States celebrated every fourth Thursday in November. This year it occurred on Thursday 23rd November and its origins go back to the early days of the Founding Fathers arriving in the United States. In 1963, President John F. Kennedy issued Proclamation 3560 on November 5, stating, "Over three centuries ago, our forefathers

in Virginia and in Massachusetts, far from home in a lonely wilderness, set aside a time of thanksgiving. On the appointed day, they gave reverent thanks for their safety, for the health of their children, for the fertility of their fields, for the love which bound them together, and for the faith which united them with their God."

Traditionally, Thanksgiving has been a celebration of the blessings of the year, including the harvest. On Thanksgiving Day, it is common for Americans to share a family meal and to celebrate in other ways. I was lucky to be able to experience this myself while on a family visit to Texas. My family in the USA were invited by friends to join them for their Thanksgiving Dinner with their own family and so I was able to enjoy this celebration. The central dish was turkey but with other meats and all the trimmings (largely Texan in nature). What was really striking was the sharing (various family members had contributed various dishes) and the sense of togetherness. I was made to feel really welcome and to feel part of this celebration.





It brought home to me how much we have to be thankful for and how good it is to have a day dedicated to gratitude for all blessings we have and receive. Of course, the holiday for many is commercialised but this should not detract from us pausing to consider all the good things in our lives, all the blessings we have received and our good fortune to be in this position. We can all make our own lists and pause, once in a while, to thank God for what we have received and perhaps celebrate Thanksgiving ourselves either on Thanksgiving Day or whenever works for us.

During the final session on 21st November we held a Reconciliation service for the candidates. On the last session on 5th December, after evaluation of the programme, we had pizzas and soft drinks for the candidates and parents. Fr. Anthony encouraged the candidates to take active part in the parish, especially as readers. It was a nice round up of the programme.

Finally, Cuba!! This trip was planned for March 2020, we all know what happened then...Covid. So it has taken $3\frac{1}{2}$ years to rearrange. But at last it happened. This wasn't all inclusive beach holiday but an exploratory trip, it surely was interesting. These are my impressions.

It's hot and sometimes wet - my trip was at the end of the rainy season and so just two days of rain. But

the rain was warm.

It's poor. Agriculture is labour intensive, there is no money for machines so it's donkey and horse power and of course human labour in the sugar cane fields. And it's horse drawn carts in abundance even on the motorways. People travel on foot, on horses, on carts pulled by donkeys or horses, on the back of huge ex Soviet army

trucks, vintage American and Russian cars (kept working through skill and ingenuity) as well as a minority of newer vehicles. Oh, and bicycles, as well as people waiting in whatever shade they can find to flag down a passing vehicle for a lift. I'm told this hitchhiking is safe, it's certainly common. There is currently a shortage of fuel among other things.





I don't understand the economy of the country, I mean the currency. There is very little acceptance of card payments, the internet signals are intermittent so I understand why this is. Also there is an embargo in place and this includes banking. An ATM will not accept any card which has any connection with the USA. So cash is king, but not the Cuban Peso except for locals. Euros are the favoured currency, sterling and US dollars are accepted on a one for one rate and then any change given in Cuban pesos. Very strange but it seems to work.

Tourism brings money to the country so tourists are well catered for. Many families host tourists on a bed and breakfast basis. Thanks, MIlly.





Cuban people smile a lot. They queue for food, for ATMs, for bread, for buses and taxis and still smile. They also kept smiling whilst reassuring me when I (almost) had a problem at the airport with my passport! Jose Marti is revered as founder of the revolutionary ideal and the airport bears his name.









Having given you my impressions of this friendly place which I have finally ticked off my bucket list I'll tell you how I spent my days exploring Havana and Trinidad, two major towns. It was fitting to see first hand the sights of history..... the Bay of Pigs, Santa Clara, Revolution Square, the memorial to Che. The stuff of revolution 60

years ago. Che's father in Argentina was a second-generation Irishman named Lynch).

In Old Havana I drank Daiquiri in Fredrikas bar as did Hemmingway and saw the beautifully maintained convertible Amercian cars from the 50s that are such a tourist draw.

I was surprised at the little evidence of Catholicism I saw. Only two churches were open, in one there was a small congregation waiting for exposition and the other, in the cemetery, was awaiting a funeral.

I saw sugar cane fields, tobacco farming and coffee plantations. I walked in the rainforest and swam in forest pools. Of course I also swam in the Carribean's beautiful sandy beaches.

fused and vulnerable they were.

I know from personal experience and those of other family carers, how difficult this forthcoming festive period can be. [Supporting a loved one with dementia is not something we ever expected to have to deal with].

The sacrifices family carers make and the challenges they face, in supporting their husband, wife, mum, dad, to live well are enormous, never mind the complexities of the dementia disease itself and other obstacles we have to overcome.

If you're planning to visit a family member and/or friend with dementia, please understand your communications with the main family carer are critical to ensuring a memorable time for everyone.

One of the issues you may be surprised to learn, and is very common, is that a family member or friend visiting do not get a realistic picture of day-to-day life. Each time my sister and brother-in-law visited mum she would "... put on a good show for them ...", as if nothing was wrong. A specialist dementia nurse told me once it was like "... they put up the defence barriers!", for fear of revealing how con-

I've had conversations with many family members who can't understand why their family member carer "... complains so much ...", and say to them "... you've no idea what it's like ...". It's not until I explain why this happens that they begin to have an understanding of the pressures the main family carer experiences every single day. Also, family carers who aren't familiar with this – like I was at the beginning – begin to question themselves as to why this happens to them and not when other family members and friends visit.

Therefore if you're planning such a visit now and in the future here are some tips in seeking to create a safe and warm environment for everyone to have a good time.



Remember to support the family carer just as much as the person with dementia

· Plan ahead and discuss with the family carer what is realistic

- · Understand that the daily routine of the family carer and person with dementia is very important, because sudden changes may result in agitation and distress. In other words try to be flexible and fit in with their daily routine.
- · It may be safer to stick to familiar traditions and routines the family member with dementia may recognise. A good example is going through old family photo albums at this time of year.
- · Don't expect the visit to be perfect and enjoy it for what it is.

Also, be flexible and understanding in case planned visits can't go ahead for whatever reason. Despite the best laid plans sometimes it may not be

possible to share in the festivities. In such cases be prepared for such separation to bring up your own feelings of grief or sadness. Look after your own mental health wellbeing.

This will also give you a small insight into what the main family carer is going through.

Finally, remember to remain in regular contact with and support the family member carer, just as much as your family member with dementia.



Mary's Meals Appeal

We have had a great term at St Bernadette's!

The children returned from their summer holidays raring to go and they have worked very hard to make good progress in all areas of school life.



During this term we have begun the celebrations for our 70th Anniversary. Our school was officially opened on 3rd October 1953 by Cardinal Griffin who held a service in Latin and blessed all areas of the school. St Bernadette's opened with 188 pupils and 7 members of staff and it has grown and grown since. We now have 465 pupils from Nursery to Y6 and 60 members of staff. We had a

lovely Mass led by Bishop John Sherrington on 4th October during which time he repeated parts of the original service and blessed all areas of our current school. Since then we have had a whole school photo, a Quiz and Pizza night for current and past parents which was really well attended and a Bingo evening for the whole community which was supported by almost 200 people! We will continue to celebrate into the new-year and we have a timetable of events on our school website www.st-bernadette.co.uk.

You are welcome to join us at the events and if you know any past pupils then please let them know and get them to contact us at school as we are in the process of developing a 70th Anniversary brochure to share with our community. Celebrations will conclude with a Summer Fete on Friday 28th June from 3.30pm.

This term we have been very successful in achieving 2 major awards. The first was recognition for our whole school focus on eating healthy foods and getting fit. It came from Healthy Schools London and it is their top Gold Award which we are delighted with. We have placed health and fitness at the centre of our curriculum and it has really raised our standards of learning and is helping all children to achieve. This was reflected in our fun run day at the end of September when all of the children ran at least 2 km-5 km and raised £3,000 for the school to support our children and families in need. The second award was very prestigious to reflect the international work that we do here with our partners in Spain, Italy and France. The International Award has come from the British Council and we are one of very few Primary schools in the country to achieve it. We are very proud of these achievements and the opportunities that they provide for our whole school community.



We are in the middle of our Christmas preparations and celebrations. We have had a very important visitor from Lapland who met all of the children and staff and gave them presents! This has been followed by the Infant Nativity play of The Bossy King and Carol Services from our Junior classes. Our choirs have been very busy singing in St Dominic's Chapel at the Harrow Catholic Schools' Carol Service and at Westminster Cathedral for the HCPT

Carol Service. Then they will be singing at Sainsbury's to raise money for charity and then visit the sick at Edgware General Hospital—busy times!! We are all looking forward to the Christmas holidays at the end of another exciting term!

<u>Car Park</u>: Soak away which caused all the flooding problems (Cascadia) Fence repairs (Tom Boyne).


